As we roll into November, the election is on everyone's mind. Once again, this election cycle proved to be contentious and unpleasant with emotions running high and candidates spouting unhealthy rhetoric. Sadly, this is nothing new in American politics.

In his book, 1920: The Year of the Six Presidents (2007). David Pietrusza chronicles how six former, present, and future presidents vied for their party's nomination.

Former President **Theodore Roosevelt**, (1901-1909), declared his candidacy to the Progressive Party (or Bull Moose Party), hoping for a third term in office, but died before election day.

The sitting President **Woodrow Wilson** (1913-1921) suffered a debilitating stroke during his last year in office, but his condition remained unknown to the public. Wilson also desired a third term, but the Democratic Party nominated James M. Cox of Ohio, who chose **Franklin Delano Roosevelt** as his vice-presidential running mate. Cox lost the election, but FDR would be elected president in 1932 and serve until his death in 1945.

The Republicans nominated **Warren G. Harding**, who won the election and served as president from 1921-1923. (He died in office of cardiac arrest.) Harding's Vice-President, **Calvin Coolidge** then served as president from 1923-1929.

The last candidate was **Herbert Hoover**, a successful businessman, well-known to the public for chairing the relief efforts in Europe after World War I. Hoover lost this election but would serve as president from 1929-1933.

Why the history lesson? Because much like today's candidates, these six men disliked one another, disagreed over policies, had their own agendas (not all in America's best interests), and tried to discredit their competitors. They filled their speeches with hateful slurs and character assassinating inuendoes. They called on their followers to rally to their cause, even suggesting violence, all the while staying out of the fray themselves. The comparisons to modern candidates are obvious.

So, what are we – as Christians – to do? How should we vote? I've read many articles on the subject, but none better than "Anticipating the Election" (July 24, 2024), by Dr. Walter Brueggemann, a retired professor of Old Testament. Brueggemann stresses that "the central insistence of the gospel for the body politic...is that the public enterprise be properly ordered as a covenant." That is, we choose people who will "rule" in such a way that it benefits everyone.

Brueggemann writes that "Christians will do well to have our political choices informed, not by habit or tradition, or by partisan zeal, or by self-interest, but by elemental claims of our covenantal faith." Our job as citizens is to translate these definitional claims of our faith into practical realities as we choose candidates who refuse "conformity to conventional social practice," and who represent instead "transformed social practice" that derives from God's grace. So, as we head to the polls, let me offer five verses that may help inform our decision-making.

God is Sovereign - Isaiah 40

Isaiah 40:28 says,"Do you not know? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. God will not grow tired or weary, and God's understanding no one can fathom." Three verses later we hear: "those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint" (v. 31). God is sovereign. God is good. God is in control. God is not surprised. God will be here long after this, and every other, election. What if we really believed and acted as if God reigned supreme?





What if we accepted that God is in control? What if we banked on the fact that God is not surprised by any of what happens? What if we trusted that God is still moving in our country? What we believe about God's sovereignty directly impacts our internal peace and our outward actions.

Pray for our Leaders - 1 Timothy 2:1-2

This can be tough work, especially if the leader is someone we did not vote for, do not agree with, or do not like. But hear Paul's words to Timothy: "I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people - for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness." Those of us who claim the name of Jesus need to pray that God draws our leaders closer, fills them with God's Spirit, and transforms them into the leaders who work for the good of all God's people.

Honor our Leaders - Romans 13:1

This one can be even harder than the last one. Paul writes: "Let everyone be subject to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God." Without an unwavering trust in the sovereignty of God and a willingness to pray for all our leaders, this one is impossible. Put another way: If our trust is in whomever is in leadership and we're not willing to pray for them, we will only honor the leaders we voted for or like. Again...this is not easy. But we are not called to do what is easy. We are called to do what is right. The two rarely go hand-in-hand.

It Is OUR lob to Love our Neighbors - Luke 10:27

The command to love our neighbor will not be impacted in any way by the person who occupies the White House. Luke records: "Jesus answered, 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and, 'Love your neighbor as yourself." How much impact does the President of the United States or any elected leader have on our ability to live out Luke 10:27? Zero Impact. Will the outcome of the election change how we view our neighbor or care for them? Not if we follow Jesus' command to love them unconditionally.

The Lord is Near - Philippians 4:5-7

Paul reminds us: "The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." The. Lord. Is. Near. Four words that change everything. God's "near-ness" is the only hope we have of not being anxious. To leave those four words out of the equation is to give a command without hope of success. Unless we know the Presence of the Anxiety-Squelcher we have no other choice than to be fearful! But...God does not leave us alone. God is right here. God does not give up. God is still with us. God is still for us. God is still...near.

From the outset, American democracy proposed to be a "city set on a hill" (Matthew 5:14), and an embodiment of welcoming wellbeing that specializes in human dignity, freedom, security, and justice. We opt for one or the other of these visions every time we vote.

Christian Education and Youth Rev. Karen Anderson

Wednesdays at The Federated Church are full of fun and energy! Our after-school and evening programs are running smoothly and drawing in an inquisitive bunch of young people. From Kidz Club and confirmation to senior high youth group, we have a great time being together and exploring issues of faith.

Kidz Club

We are continuing our study of Joseph from the book of Genesis this month. Each week we study a new part of his incredible journey of faith, from beloved son to persecuted slave to "savior" of his people. It is fascinating to observe the similarities between Joseph and Jesus. God foreshadows His plans throughout the Bible. It is hard to believe that by the end of November we will be finished with our study of Joseph, and we will begin working on the Christmas pageant, which is set for December 15 during worship. This year is flying by!

Sunday School

Our Sunday school classes meet each week (K-1, 2-6, 7-12) for study and fellowship. Each section is studying a slightly different variation on the idea of the "most important" stories/lessons/ ideas of our faith. Although our class sizes vary from week to week, the groups enjoy getting together to learn together. Beginning at the end of November we will be spending a few weeks preparing for the Christmas pageant.

Senior High Youth Group

Our weekly gatherings continue to challenge and connect one another. Thus far we have explored subjects such as: checking into our personal relationship with God, the implications of human cloning, stereotypes, living in community, and an episode of the Simpsons that touched on several issues of faith. Our weekly topics are generated from what the youth are interested in discussing from a perspective of faith. It always proves to be an evening of interesting discussions, and fun games.

Women's Bible Study

Our Tuesday 11:15am Women's Bible Study group is slowly working our way through Paul's letter to the Colossians. There is so much to reflect on and rest on within each verse that we are finding it difficult to move quickly, which is absolutely great! Feel free to join us for this time of intense study.

Presbytery of Minnesota Valleys

The Presbytery of MN Valleys met at Federated Church on Saturday, October 12, 2025. Approximately 67 people attended. We structured our meeting around Hymn #312, "Take Us as We Are, O God," highlighting the four words that Jesus used whenever he shared a meal – Take, Bless, Break, and Give – to guide our worship and work. Elder Connie Seltz served as our voting commissioner and served communion with the Rev. Leanne Thompson (Willmar).

Vivian Whipple provided music throughout the morning. The Trio of Karen Anderson, Cindy Holte, and Sondra Lee provided music in the afternoon. The Kitchen Crew served chicken-asparagus hot dish, side salad, and dessert at noon. - The Presbytery recognized Elder LeRoy Ennenga (Worthington) for his 40 years of service to the Presbytery.

The Presbytery received reports from the Executive Presbytery Beth Buckwalter-Miller, Stated Clerk, Pam Prouty, General Assembly representative David Lick. Synod representatives Scott Prouty and Bev Raske, and the chairperson of Operations Patty Brandts.

The Presbytery proposed amending the terms of its moderators but decided to keep the current leadership in place pending further discussion, which means that Pastor Doug continues to serve as Moderator of the Presbytery for the foreseeable future...


